

Waltz, a piece clearly inspired by Terry Riley's In C, was written by Michael Nyman, an English composer whose works combine such disparate styles as classical, rock and roll, and minimalism. The score calls for each player to repeat a small melodic figure as often as he or she likes, then progress to the next until all the figures have been played. The musicians come together at the end, repeating the final melodic fragment until everyone has arrived there. (L.S.)

Three Piano Rags by James Tenney mark the end of a period in Tenney's life when he had been composing rather extraordinary electronic and computer music (roughly 1962-1967). The rags are an exercise in a gentler, more lyrical idiom. Tenney is a fine pianist, and something of an American music scholar, and these three pieces reflect this, as well as his interest in a more conventional compositional craft. The rags are more or less in the "style" of the great rag composers, but many aspects (like the use of the diatonic second, extended polyphony, and elaborate harmonic and motivic development) are unique to Tenney and might classify them as "modern" rags. PROGRAM NOTES

Chromatic Canon (for Steve Reich) is a relative ly recent piece of Tenney's and is being premiered on tonight's concert. It is a remarkable canon/experiment in serialism, pattern techniques, and intonation. It can be played by to pianos tuned in an elegant just intonation system or, as it is being played tonight (for purely practical reasons), in tempered intonation The piece is both a retrograde and a mirror image of itself, each of the voices moving from a chord built around the primes of the harmonic series to the complement of that chord, and vio versa. The dedication to Tenney's friend Reich pays homage to the aesthetic of the latter's music and hearkens to the fact that Tenney was one of the original members of Reich's ensemble in the 1960's. Waltz: In Memoriam - Maurice Ravel, a short piano piece, is from the collection Waltzes of Twenty-Five Contemporary Composers (C. F. Peter Moran is one of the two people responsible for "the waltz project," in which twenty-five composers were invited to write a short waltz. Amorthose commissioned were Lou Harrison, Philip Glass, John Cage, and others. (Larry Simon)

You Were Warned was written in 1962, a period previous to "performance art" and "happenings", by Tom Nixon, an avant-garde composer living in California. It was created during the fluxus era. Many of Nixon's pieces incorporate aspect which may be considered non-musical. (L.S.)

Music in Similar Motion, written in 1969, was arranged for orchestra in 1981. Philip Glass i one of the country's foremost composers. He is an originator of the style known as "minimalism His compositions from the 1960's are character-
